## OBJECTIVES

The HANSHEP Group seeks to achieve the following:

- Improve the delivery of quality healthcare to poor people;
- Reduce the number of poor people paying out-of-pocket for medicines and treatment;
- Increase the provision of better access to quality health systems to poor people;
- Reduce the price of medicine;
- Improve access to information to poor people on preventive care, treatment options, and appropriate prices for services;
- Increase access to affordable priority disease-specific interventions; and
- Overall, improve access to better healthcare for poor people and have increased financial protection against catastrophic expenses for medicines or medical services.

HANSHEP is a platform for the group to propose and fund programmes, share resources, and disseminate learning and best practice to enhance collaboration and reduce duplication.

## ACHIEVEMENTS

Since it was established, the HANSHEP Group has:

- Grown its membership from 8 to 11 of the **leading government agencies, foundations and multilaterals** working with non-state actors in health around the world;
- Attracted funding of over **USD\$135 million** to support a portfolio of **14 innovative programmes** enhancing the contribution of non-state actors to mixed health systems in developing countries, with many more programmes under development;
- Been awarded a **USD\$1.6 million grant** from the World Bank Development Grant Facility to facilitate new mechanisms for cross-agency, public-private and South-South knowledge exchange;
- Launched the **Health Systems Hub** ([www.healthsystemshub.org](http://www.healthsystemshub.org)), a brand new platform specially designed to support knowledge exchange, networking and collaboration among global health practitioners, policymakers, researchers and development partners interested in mixed (public and private) health systems.
